What is the purpose of this update?

This document tells you how the Australian Financials ETF Fund has performed and what fees were charged. The document will help you to compare the fund with other funds. Smartshares Limited prepared this update in accordance with the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013. This information is not audited and may be updated.

Description of this fund

The Australian Financials ETF Fund invests in the Smartshares Exchange Traded Funds' Australian Dividend Fund

Total value of the fund: \$593,440
The date the fund started: 28 October 2016

What are the risks of investing?

Risk indicator for the Australian Financials ETF Fund¹



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund's assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

Note that even the lowest category does not mean a riskfree investment, and there are other risks that are not captured by this rating.

This risk indicator is not a guarantee of a fund's future performance. The risk indicator is based on the returns data for 5 years to 31 March 2018. While risk indicators are usually relatively stable, they do shift from time to time. The risk indicator will continue to be updated in future fund updates.

Other specific risks

There are other risks that may increase the risk to returns for investors, which are not reflected in the risk indicator. These risks include underlying fund tracking risk. In particular, the fund invests in an exchange traded fund, which is designed to track the return on a specific index. Tracking difference may occur when the weighting of each of the financial products included in the index changes, and the fund that tracks the index is not able to exactly match that change. There is a risk that this may result in the fund achieving a return that is lower than the index being tracked by the fund.


How has the fund performed?

Small differences in fees and charges can have a big impact on your investment over the long term.


Example of how this applies to an investor

Jess had \$10,000 in the fund and did not make any further contributions. At the end of the year, Jess incurred a loss after fund charges were deducted of -\$1,156 (that is - 11.56% of her initial \$10,000). Jess paid other charges of \$12. This gives Jess a total loss after tax of -\$1,168 for the year.

Notes

1 Market index returns (as well as actual returns) have been used to complete the risk indicator, as the fund has not been in existence for 5 years. As a result, the risk indicator may provide a less reliable indicator of the potential future volatility of the fund.
